




L&C TOWER

Life & Casualty Insurance Company was founded in 1903 by Andrew Mizell Burton, great grandfather of Amy Burton Grant. In 1925, the company moved into the Annex. After barely surviving the Great Depression, the company thrived during the 30s and 40s and out-grew its offices.

Around 1950, Life & Casualty commissioned Nashville based architect Edwin Keeble to design their new headquarters building at the corner of 4th and Church. The new building was completed in 1957.

The building's tall and slender design resulted from the company's goal to provide its employees with plenty of windows and exterior views. The design required a zoning variance that the company negotiated in exchange for providing 15-foot sidewalks and additional traffic lanes on Church Street and 4th Avenue. The building was the tallest in the Southeast, USA.

WLAC-TV was owned by Life & Casualty Insurance Company and began broadcasting in 1954. It was the CBS affiliate in Nashville. The TV show aired a groundbreaking show on Friday and Saturday nights during the mid-and late-1960s called Night Train, which was recorded in a studio located in the Annex. Featured guest artists included Wilson Pickett, Jackie Shane, James Brown, Gladys Knight, Otis Redding and Jimi Hendrix. WLAC-TV helped launch the career of Oprah Winfrey by making her a regular news anchor in the early 1970s.
