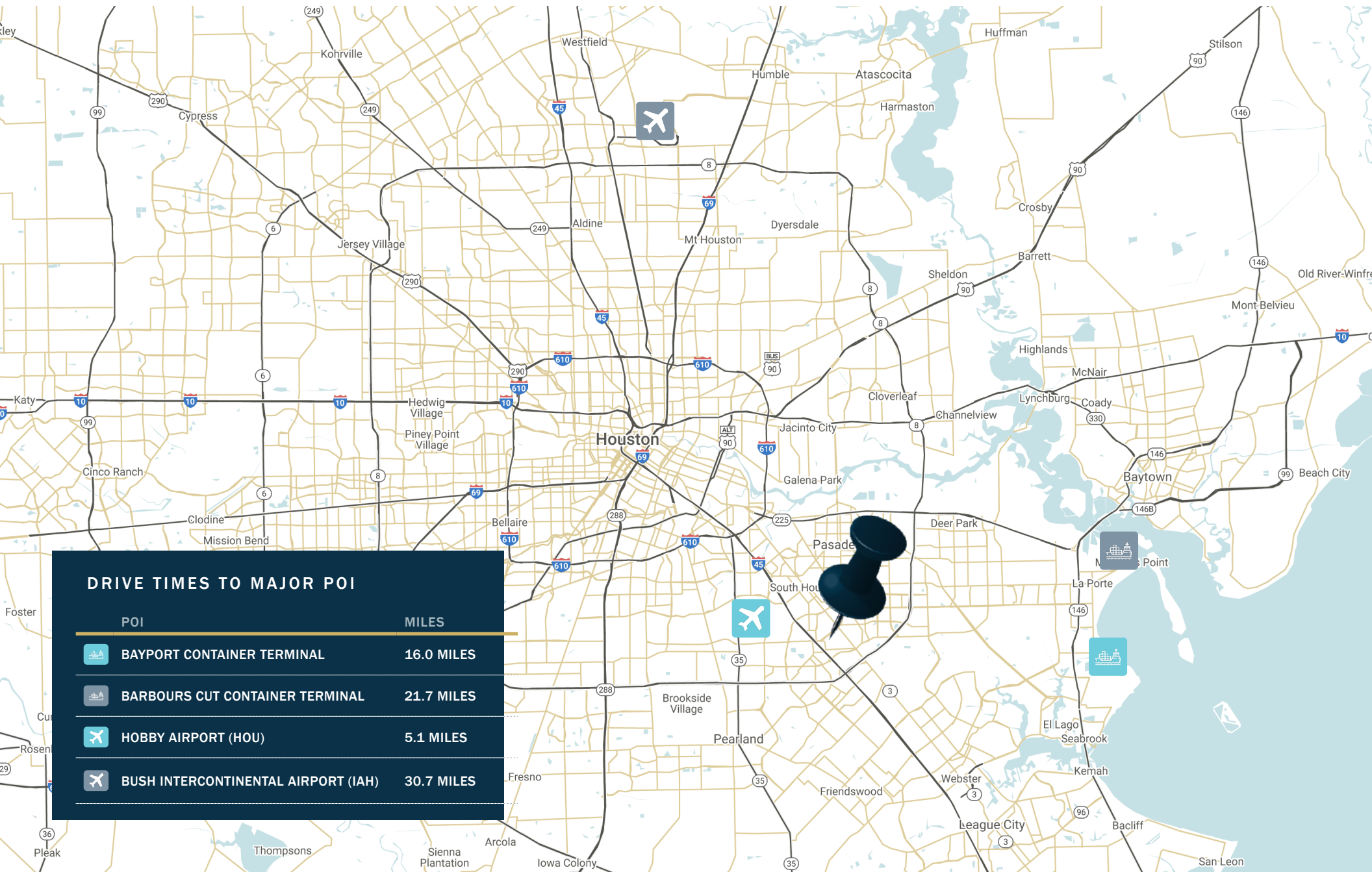

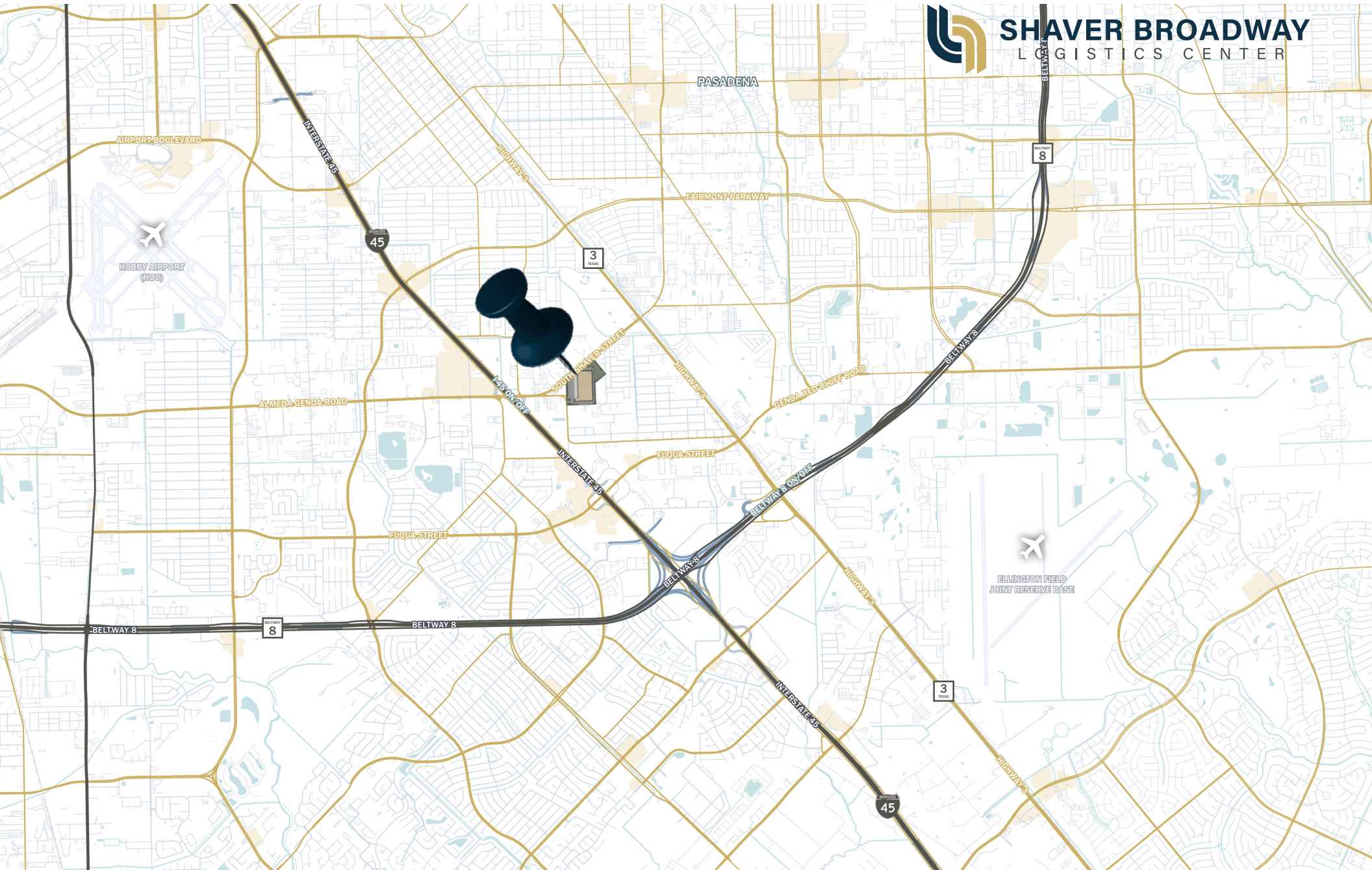

The Houston Metro is the fifth-largest city in the United States and the most populous in Texas, offering a unique blend of Southern hospitality, urban sophistication, and cultural diversity. Houston Ship Channel is ranked the number one waterway in the U.S., according to a recent report by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE), handling approximately 12% of the nation's total waterborne tonnage.

PORT OF HOUSTON

For more than 100 years, Port Houston has owned and operated the public wharves and terminals along the Houston Ship Channel, including the area's largest breakbulk facility and two of the most efficient container terminals in the country. Port Houston is the advocate and a strategic leader for the Channel. The Houston Ship Channel complex and its more than 200 private and eight public terminals, collectively known as the Port of Houston, is the nation's largest port for waterborne tonnage and an essential economic engine for the Houston region, the state of Texas and the U.S. The Port of Houston supports the creation of nearly 1.5 million jobs in Texas and 3.4 million jobs nationwide, and economic activity totaling \$439 billion in Texas and \$906 billion in economic impact across the nation.

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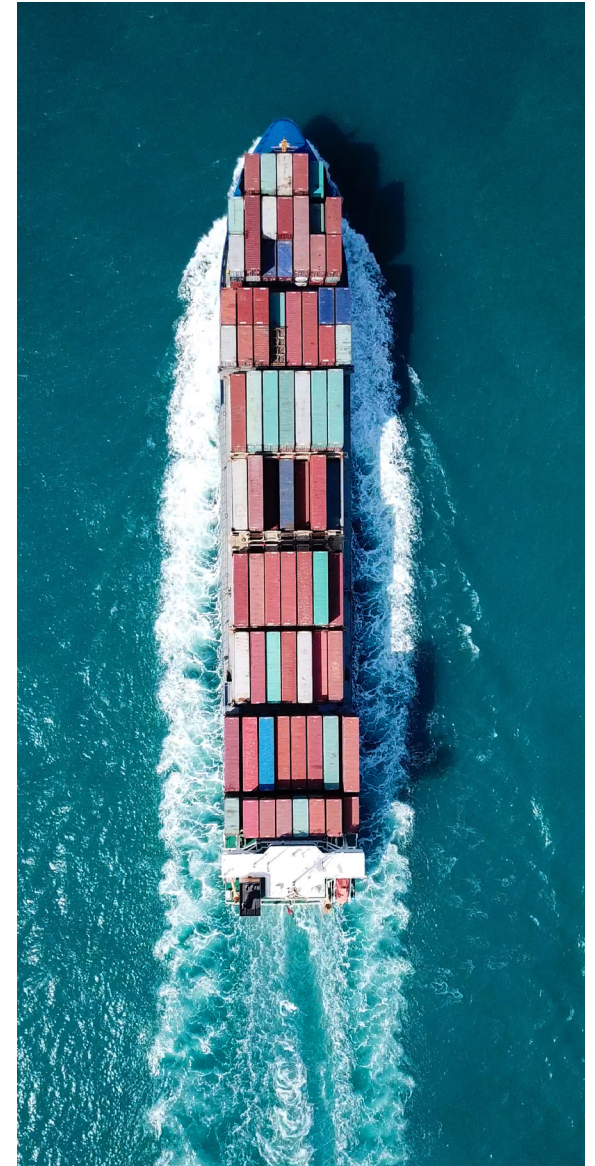
AREA EMPLOYMENT DRIVERS

The HOUSTON SHIP CHANNEL (HSC) is a vital waterway located in Houston, Texas, serving as one of the busiest and most important maritime thoroughfares in the United States. It is part of the Port of Houston, which is one of the largest ports in the world, handling significant amounts of both international and domestic cargo. The channel itself is a man-made, dredged waterway that stretches approximately 52 miles from the Gulf of Mexico, through Galveston Bay, and into the industrial areas around Houston. The Houston Ship Channel is a critical piece of infrastructure for both the U.S. maritime industry and the global petrochemical supply chain.

Economic Impact: The channel is a key economic driver, not only for Houston and Texas but also for the entire U.S. economy. It handles over 200 million tons of cargo annually and contributes billions of dollars in economic activity. The cargo includes crude oil, refined petroleum products, chemicals, agricultural products, and more. The Port of Houston ranks first in the U.S. in foreign waterborne tonnage and second in total tonnage.

Petrochemical Facilities: One of the defining features of the Houston Ship Channel is its close connection to the petrochemical industry. Surrounding the channel are numerous refineries, chemical plants, and storage facilities that process oil and gas products. The proximity of these facilities to both the Gulf of Mexico and the inland distribution networks makes the region an ideal hub for petrochemical production and distribution.

Ongoing Expansion and Modernization: To maintain its competitive edge and accommodate larger vessels, the Houston Ship Channel is undergoing various expansion projects. These include widening and deepening the channel to handle newer, larger ships, especially those in the Post-Panamax class. The expansion projects are crucial for maintaining the channel's status as a key conduit for U.S. energy exports, particularly as the country increases its exports of oil and natural gas.
