
This three-story concrete and brick structure is an unusual building among its double shot gun neighbors. When this section of Magazine street developed in earnest during the late 19<sup>th</sup> century the two parcels which now hold 3535 Magazine matched their neighbors, occupied by a pair of single-story double shotgun houses. For several blocks in either direction this section of Magazine Street was largely residential, but as the early 20<sup>th</sup> century progressed many institutions and business began to occupy the residential structures.

Jefferson Motor Company (JMC) got its start in Gretna, an automobile friendly town where motorized transportation was seen as a necessity to getting around the largely rural West Bank. They sold Ford cars, trucks, and tractors. The company quickly shifted its sights to New Orleans proper in 1924, setting up shop at 1030 Louisiana Ave while the new building was being constructed at Magazine and Foucher. As a way to set themselves apart in the early car market JMC advertised "gold seal service" which offered 24-hour shop service for Ford owners.

These early dealerships were showpieces of the popular architectural styles of the time, displaying the car in interior showrooms visible through large picture windows to the sidewalk, in bustling downtown commercial corridors of the time. These early dealerships were geared toward the pedestrian, unlike the massive lots filled with shiny new cars, of today, which needs to appeal to fast moving vehicular traffic, these early buyers were often walking in to buying their first car.

The Jefferson Motor Company's new structure would inhabit those early ideals of car dealership architecture with a three-story fire-proof structure, which towered over the adjacent buildings. The ground floor, with its large picture windows held the showroom, the upper portion of the building was devoted to service departments and "stock" including additional vehicles which were transported up and down on a large, car sized elevator at the rear of the building with an access door off Foucher, (this elevator is still in use today). The building was designed in a Neoclassical style by Weiss & Dreyfous Inc., Architects and constructed by R.P. Farnsworth and Company, General Contractors. It was boasted in the New Orleans State newspaper that the "building will be rushed to completion in about ninety days" in reality it took about 5 months with the grand opening being pushed back from June 15<sup>th</sup> to July 1<sup>st</sup>.

# Jefferson Motor Co. Erects Building



This new and attractive building is being erected on the corner of Magazine and Foucher streets for the **JEFFERSON MOTOR COMPANY**, the distributors for the Ford Motor company, and will specialize in Ford cars and Fordson tractors. The building is a three-story structure, the lower floor of which will be used for a sales room, the upper portion of the building being devoted to stock rooms and service departments. Plans for the building were made by Weiss & Dreyfous, Inc., Architects, and construction work will be in the hands of R. P. Farnsworth and company, general contractors. C. G. Robertson is president and general manager of the **Jefferson Motor company**.

New Orleans Item Jan 31, 1925

The building only served at a Ford dealership for 10 years, from 1925-1935 it was then leased by Mother's Home-Made Pie Shop, owned by Ben and Margaret Perkowski a first- and second-generation immigrant couple from Poland. They opened a restaurant in New Orleans shortly after their marriage in 1920 that quickly failed but one item from the restaurant that was extremely popular was Mrs. Perkowski's pies. So the couple decided to focus their energy on baking with a small operation at 2628 Magazine selling mostly to restaurants,

they expanded their business to a larger home at 1050 Carondelet and finally to the large commercial space at what was then 3523 Magazine. By the time they had made the final move their offerings had expanded beyond pies to cakes, pastries and breads sold in restaurants and grocery stores throughout New Orleans. The Perkowskis brought many family members to New Orleans to work in the bakery and eventually purchased the building.

When the bakery closed in 1953 a notice in the New Orleans State listing the contents for auction shows what a large operation Mother's had become, some of the items included 6 delivery trucks, a 600 lbs. capacity dough mixer, and a bread wrapping machine that could wrap up to 45 loaves a minute.

Over the years the business has expanded to other locations in Old Metairie and the West Bank but this building on Magazine has always been its flagship location. During Harry's 60+ years here some changes have been made to the exterior of the building. The windows and garage door on the Foucher St side were filled in as well as the garage door on the one-story section on the Aline St side of the front façade and a canvas awning has been added which does obscure some of its original Neoclassical details but in large part the building stands much as it did in 1925. Still standing out next to its neighbors but very much an integral part of the fabric of the neighborhood.


Sanborn's Insurance Maps 1896

Miss Wright won't find it hard to begin the battle with the world here in New Orleans.







## PIE-MAKING FIRM LEASES BUILDING; \$90,000 INVOLVED

Magazine Street Structure  
Taken for Five Years in  
Expansion Move

Steady growth of a business started 11 years ago resulted in the leasing by Ben Perkowski, operator of the Mother's Home Made Pie Company, of the three-story brick and concrete building at 3523 Magazine street, according to an announcement Wednesday by Latter and Blum, Inc., who negotiated the deal.

The deal involved approximately \$90,000, with the cost of new machinery to be installed included. The lease is for five years, with the privilege of renewal for an additional five years or of purchasing the building.

Sale of a commercial property at 1016 Magazine street for the second time in less than a week also was announced Wednesday.

This property was purchased by an investor Saturday through J. Burrows Johnson, real estate broker, and Mr. Johnson announced Wednesday he had again sold it. It was purchased by the Bishop-Edell Machine Works, Inc., whose plant it adjoins. It is to be conditioned and occupied by the new purchaser.

### Residences Sold

Sale of several residences and vacant properties was announced by agents Wednesday.

The building leased by Mr. Perkowski at Magazine and Foucher streets is being extensively remodeled and when this is completed new machinery expected to cost approximately \$45,000 will be installed. The machinery will be of the newest type and will serve to make the bakery one of the most modern in the South, according to Mr. Perkowski. The building will provide 28,000 square feet of floor space and is expected to be ready for occupancy by October 1.

The interior will be finished in white. The leased premises include a wide and deep steel and glass-covered canopy along the downtown side of the building, and this will be used for the fleet of 13 delivery trucks.

### Former Soldier

Mr. Perkowski came to New Orleans in 1916 as a soldier, assigned to the bakeshop at Jackson Barracks. After receiving his discharge he located here and after a year or two opened a small restaurant on Rampart street. He started baking pies in the rear room and later bought a house and converted the basement into a bake shop where his wife worked with him. The business grew steadily until it became necessary to get the present quarters at 1050 Carondelet street. More than two years ago it became evident that larger quarters were necessary and the deal announced Wednesday is the culmination of more than two years' effort to find what Mr. Perkowski believed was the right place.

Mrs. Perkowski has worked with her husband throughout the growth of the concern. Her sister, Miss Helen Goliwas, is secretary of the company. Most of the original employees are still with the concern. Twenty-eight workers are now employed, the newest with two years' service. Further expansion will be necessary in October. The concern sells only to retail dealers.

The goodness of Mother's Home-Made Pies was maintained, and the demand sped throughout the city. And now, the Mother's Home-Made Pie Shop is located in its new, more modern and larger home at 1050 Carondelet street. This brings the history of this interesting business up to today.

To the line of Mother's Home-Made Pies in all the popular flavors is now being added a general line of fancy cakes and pastries, which ranges from the small pastry to a most elaborate wedding cake, made to order. Only the best of ingredients are used by Mr. Perkowski in making his products. The pure fruit is used in making Mother's Pies, which accounts to a great degree for their popularity.

They are delivered daily, and Mr. Perkowski suggests that those places which have not yet tried his line should put them in on approval. He guarantees that they will be appreciated by the consumers.

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




