DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Blue Max is one of the larger houses of this block of Bohemia Avenue. It is essentially a four bay long, two bay deep, three story frame structure with a two story gallery across its west facade. To the east are two wings both two storys.

The porch is assymetrically placed across its facade. It appears to have been built in at least two stages and probably three.

Apparently, there was a one story porch across the facade which extended only the width of the facade. It had a paneled ceiling which it still possesses. Secondly, there appears to have been added a porch on the Third Street side and an enclosed porch on the south side. Finally all three porchs were joined on the first story, and the second story added apparently in the 20th century.

The facade of the structure has four windows and a central entrance on the first story with four windows on the second and third storys. The first story windows have 4/4 sash and paneled shutters which extend nearly to the floor. The central entrance has sidelights and transom typical of the second and third quarters of the 19th century. On the second story are 6/6 sash and louvered shutters and on the third story there are only 3/3 sash and no shutters. The wall of the third story is covered with shiplap siding whereas the walls below are covered with weatherboard. There is a small deck on the hip roof which may have had a balustrade.

The rear wings were built in two stages, the first is two storys tall and two bays long. The second is not as wide, however, along its north side the width is taken up by a one story porch, now enclosed and used as a Real Estate office. The latter porch possesses a very good period stair down to the ground floor where there may have been a kitchen in the cellar.

On each side of the building the chimneys have an interesting cap with two stepped courses, a course of saw-tooth, and two upper courses. The house is painted white with blue shutters.

Between the house and the Johnson House is a retaining wall covered with ivy, like the Brady house yard.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Blue Max is important architecturally because it is a larger version of the second period of construction in Chesapeake City. It is also important because of the original detail, including the porch ceiling, the side (north) porch stair and original wall paper in the third story rooms. It, like the Brady house has a retaining wall between the side and back yards.

William Lindsey, one of the three brothers who operated a saw-mill on the causeway, built this house for his family around 1854.

In 1888, Thomas J. Cleaver, superintendent of the C. & D. Canal, bought this house from the Lindsey heirs. Mr. Cleaver was responsible to the legislatures of the States of Maryland and Delaware for inforcing the laws regulating traffic on the Canal. One rule which proved very inconvenient prohibited opening the locks on Sunday. A boat that started through the Canal late Saturday often had to wait until Monday for the locks to open.

The next owner of this house was Dr. Thomas J. Conrey, who kept his office here. Dr. Conrey is supposed to have committed suicide in the house. Frank Conrey, the Doctor's brother, bought the property for \$2,500.00 in 1930. He was the proprietor of a general store in Franklin Hall and the operator of a coal yard off Second Street where a boat yard is now located.

The house is now being used for an antique shop and real estate office with living quarters and work rooms on the second and third floors.




