



HIS IS MY MASTERPIECE," Highgate Estate and Gardens owner Jack Rallo exclaims.

When Jack and his partner, Jeff Hough, first visited the iconic Greensboro home, there was not much on the property besides several large, old trees, a beaten up garage and the circular driveway. But Jack had the ability to see the potential and knew immediately upon entering the historic grand lady that he would transform it into his masterpiece.

"For the first time in my life, I had come home," Jack says. "I love to decorate and I love to design gardens, that's my private joy. Somehow, I got here to be able to do that."

Jack and Jeff bought the home in 2001 and originally kept the name,

The Higdon House, after the former owners. Initially, Jack decided to use the house as a bed and breakfast. Years later, after listening to some local residents, he chose to transform the first floor into a restaurant. It was during that time that people began asking if they could host weddings on the property.

"It really wasn't until he closed down the restaurant and we were saying, 'Well what are we going to do now? Do we just go back to the bed and breakfast? What do you want to do?" recalls Jeff.

In 2008, Jack decided to go all in and transform the property into the





unique wedding venue that it is today, meanwhile returning the home to its former glory as a bed and breakfast. The first thing Jack added was the outdoor wedding chapel. Inspired by the architecture from "The Lord of the Rings," Jack enlisted the help of master carpenter Oliver Porter to turn his drawings of a three arch wedding chapel into a reality.

Today, the chapel stands tall among some of the most beautiful gardens on the two-and-a-half-acre property. Over the years, Jack and Jeff have added more buildings to better serve their clients' needs, including an indoor chapel and events space, groom's quarters and storage buildings for the wedding necessities.

"There has been a lot of work here over the years," says Jack. "It took a long time to get here."


With his health on the decline, Jack had to step away from managing the property. During that time,
