Pocatello is a significant city in southeastern Idaho, often referred to as the "Gateway to the Northwest" or "Gate City" due to its historical role as a trade and transportation hub along the Oregon Trail and for the Union Pacific Railroad, It's nestled in the Portneuf River valley, within the western foothills of the Rocky Mountains.

Key Characteristics & Demographics (as of 2023):

- Population: Approximately 56,320 57,200 (though some sources cite a larger metropolitan statistical area population around 88,500).
- Median Age: 32.9 years.
- Median Household Income: Around \$57,931 \$64,080.
- Homeownership Rate: 63.1% 68.6%.
- Citizenship: A high percentage of residents (97.9% 98.3%) are
- Ethnic Composition: The largest ethnic group is White (Non-Hispanic), making up about 81.1% 81.9% of the population. Hispanic or Latino residents constitute around 9.23% - 9.59%.
- Education: Idaho State University (ISU) is a major educational institution, awarding thousands of degrees annually. Roughly 32.9% of the city's population holds a Bachelor's Degree or higher.

Historical Significance:

- · Oregon Trail & Railroad: Pocatello's growth is inextricably linked to its position on the Oregon Trail and its development as an important railway junction for the Union Pacific Railroad.
- Chief Pocatello: The city is named after Chief Pocatello of the Shoshone tribe, who granted the railroad permission to pass through the Fort Hall Indian Reservation.
- Early Settlements: Fort Hall, one of the first permanent settlements in the region, was established nearby in 1834.
- Industrial Development: Beyond its railroad importance, Pocatello expanded industrially with the acquisition of a naval ordnance plant and a phosphate reduction works in the 1940s. More recently, it has embraced high technology, being recognized for its economic recovery and as a "Best Small Place for Business."

Pocatello's economy is diverse, with key sectors including:


- Education: Driven by Idaho State University, which is a significant employer and draws students from around the globe.
