Proximity & Location Map



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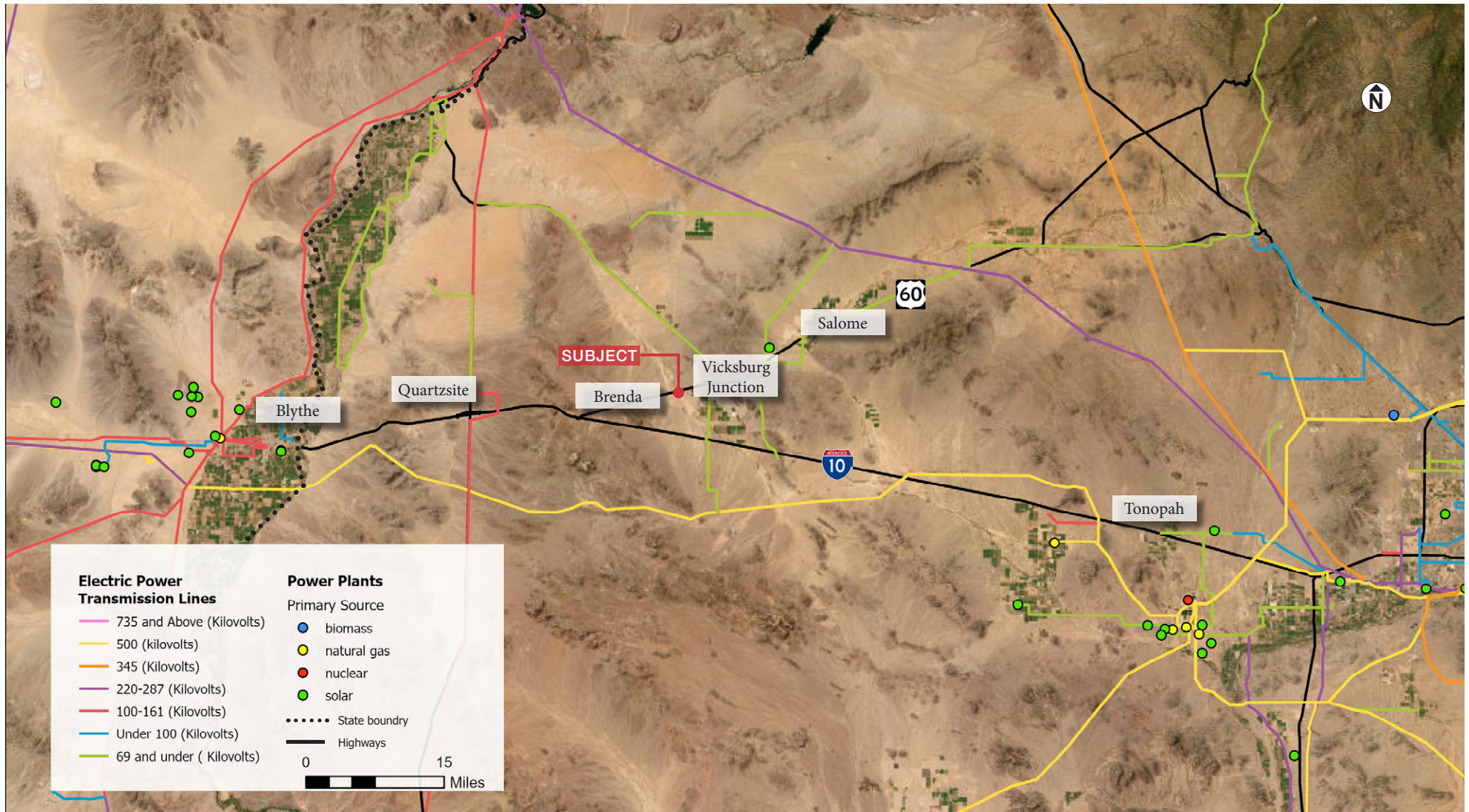
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Power Lines & Power Plant Map



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Nearby towns of Quartzsite and Salome

What makes Quartzsite so attractive?

Daytime temperatures from December through March hover around 70 degrees in Quartzsite, Arizona, situated in the Sonoran Desert.



Quartzsite is a popular wintertime destination for snowbirds, a regular stop for RV'ers on one of the major cross-country freeways in the U.S., and a filming location for 2020's Nomadland. The town boasts more RV slots than houses; RV parks line Main Street east and west, and U.S. 95 north and south of Main. The season in Quartzsite unofficially starts in September and ends on July 31.

During the famous Arizona winters, Quartzsite is filled with parades and music. Festivities start in November with live music put on by the town and the Quartzsite Improvement Association. Between opening Santa's workshop and local arts and crafts boutiques, the Christmas season kicks off with the Christmas Light Parade in early December and ends with a New Year's Eve street dance.

Salome's Sand Dance

Salome's reputation as desert inferno so dry local frogs didn't know how to swim goes back nearly a century to the yarns of humorist Dick Wick Hall. He operated the Laughing Gas Station that advertised "Free Hot Air," published a newspaper and wrote syndicated columns that put Salome on the map.

In 1904, Hall and other investors founded Salome about 90 minutes northwest of Phoenix. Grace Salome Pratt gave the town its name and motto — "Where she danced." It's said that Salome got out of a car barefoot and quickly took to dancing to keep her feet from burning on the desert sand.

The highway linked Phoenix to the west coast. Cafes, truck stops, gas stations and motels served motorists for more than a half century along U.S. 60/70. But construction of Interstate 10 in the 1970s ended the glory days of motor tourism. It left Salome, Hope, Wenden and Aguila marooned in the desert.

Still, treasures remain in Salome. Ex-rock band roadie Rande Wolters saved the Westward Motel, a block off U.S. 60, and turned it into a desert gem. It is four cozy rooms in a shady ranch yard with lots of succulents, a sentinel saguaro and many relaxing outdoor spots to enjoy the stillness and dark skies



of the desert in Salome.

The Little Roadside Chapel is an oddity worth a look along Salome Road south of town.

In the 1930s and early 40s, California had a 3-day waiting period, so Salome became a romance trip destination with the local justice of the peace offering quicky marriage ceremonies to traveling couples.

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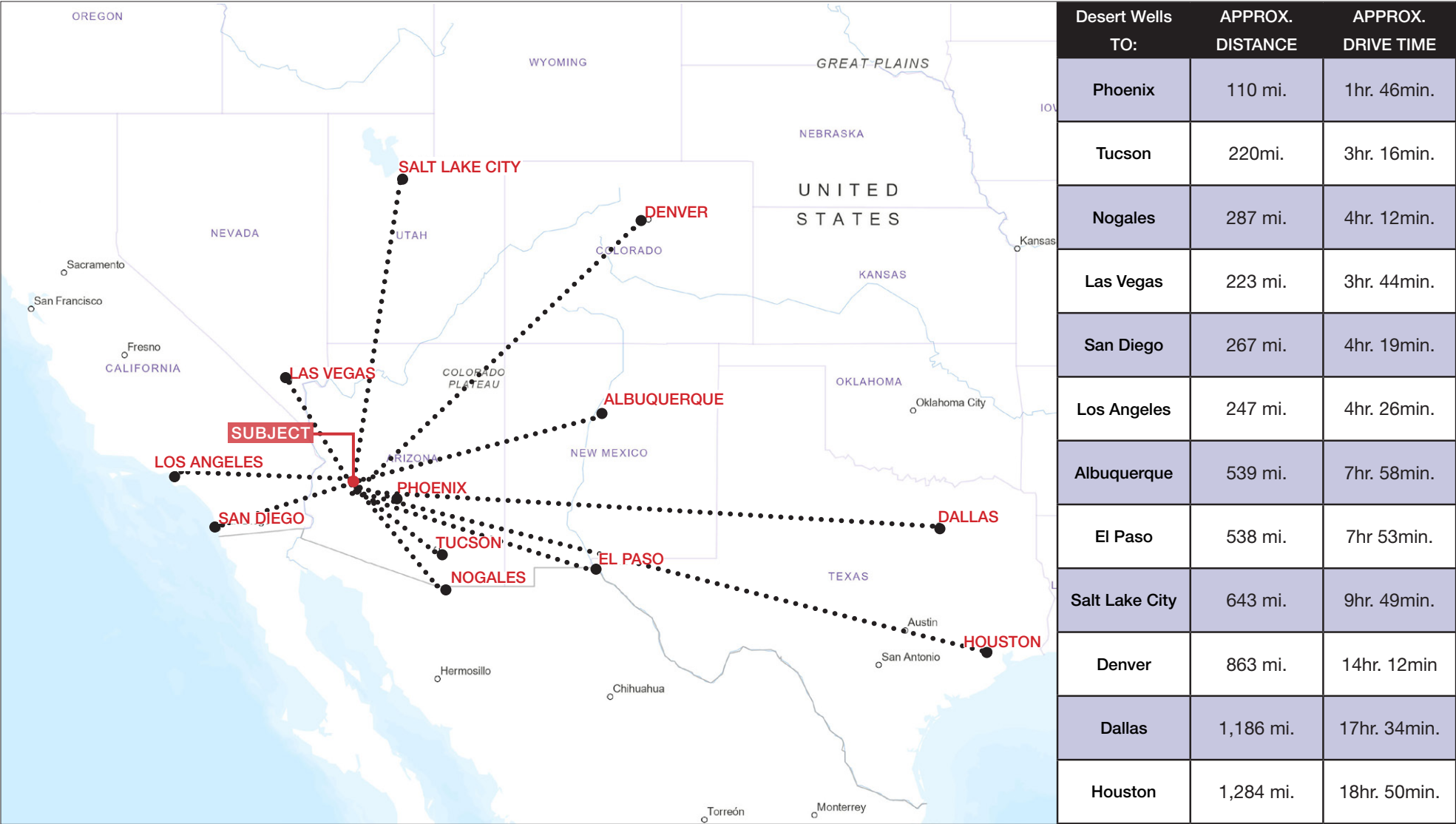
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Drive Time Map



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
