## 701 N Oak St, Springfield GA



The Jones House – A Springfield Legacy
Originally constructed in 1833, The Jones House is
the oldest known residence in Springfield, Georgia. It
was first located on Lot 4, near what is now the
Effingham Museum in the historic Old Jail at 1002
North Pine Street. The home was once occupied by
John Phillip Jones, who married Elizabeth Waller,
both early figures in the town's history.

After serving as both a private residence and hotel on its original site, the house was relocated in 1909 to its present location at 701 North Oak Street. That same year, it was transformed into the Parkview Hotel under the ownership and management of Mrs. Walton M. Seckinger (née Lena May Wilder, later Mrs. Hardee McLeod). The hotel became a popular boarding spot, frequently hosting Brinson Railroad employees and officials.

In later years, the property continued to operate as a boarding and apartment house under the management of Mrs. Theresia "Tressie" Upchurch, daughter of Lena Seckinger McLeod.

In 1951, the home entered a new chapter as the private residence of Bernard and Ethelyn (Scott) Mock, restoring its role as a family home—a role it continues to serve today.

Preserved through generations and transformations, The Jones House remains a symbol of Springfield's enduring heritage.
