



MCMINN COUNTY

McMinn County, Tennessee encompasses 430.13 square miles. Incorporated areas within McMinn County include the City of Athens, Town of Calhoun, Town of Englewood, City of Etowah, and the City of Niota. The City of Athens is the largest incorporated area and a Micropolitan Statistical Area. The Athens Micropolitan Area is part of the larger Chattanooga – Cleveland – Athens Combined Statistical Area. The 2010 Census of Population shows the population in McMinn County is 52,341, a 6.8 percent (6.8%) increase from the 2000 Census of Population.

Companies using advanced technology in a county that retains its small town charm create both an excellent location for a business and a great quality of life.























Chattanooga, the birthplace of the tow truck, is home to the International Towing and Recovery Hall of Fame and Museum, the Hunter Museum of American Art and the Tennessee Valley Railroad Museum, which has the largest operating historic railroad in the South. Other sites within the city include the Chattanooga Zoo at Warner Park, the National Park Service's Point Park and the Battle for Chattanooga Museum.

Chattanooga is the fourth-largest city in the state of Tennessee, with a population of 167,674 as of the 2010 census, and an estimated population of 171,279 in 2012. Chattanooga lies approximately 120 miles to the northwest of Atlanta, Georgia, 120 miles to the southwest of Knoxville, Tennessee, about 135 miles to the southeast of Nashville, Tennessee, about 120 miles to the northeast of Huntsville, Alabama, and about 148 miles to the northeast of Birmingham, Alabama.



GRANTS

FastTrack Economic Development Fund

- Provides additional grant support for companies expanding or locating in Tennessee with reimbursable grants made to local industrial development boards
- Aids companies in a variety of ways, including relocation expenses, temporary office space, capital improvements, retrofitting and other expenditures not previously covered by FastTrack infrastructure or job training grants

FastTrack eligibility and funding levels are determined by:

- Amount of company investment
- Number of new hires/upgrades
- Wages of new hires/upgrades
- Types of skills and knowledge that must be obtained
- Location of the project





INTERNATIONAL BUSINESS

The Volunteer State is home to 864 foreign-based establishments that have invested over \$30.1 billion in capital and employ more than 116,000 Tennesseans.

In 2013 alone, the Tennessee Department of Economic and Community Development projects accounted for 52 commitments from foreign-owned businesses that created 9,215 jobs and \$1.68 billion in capital investment. This FDI accounted for nearly 40 percent of all Tennessee's new jobs committed last year and nearly one-third of all capital investment committed in the state. These major foreign projects included South Korean-owned Hankook Tire (1,800 new jobs, \$800 million investment), Japanese-owned Calsonic Kansei (1,200 new jobs, \$109.6 capital investment) and Swiss-owned UBS (1,000 new jobs, \$36.5 million capital investment).

Exports to Tennessee's ten largest export markets topped \$23 billion in 2013, an increase of 34.1% from 2010, outpacing the percentage growth for all countries.

Tennessee Business By Land:

Our network of eight interstate highways puts most major U.S. markets within a day's drive or less. Tennessee businesses also enjoy fast, efficient access to six Class 1 railroads, including CSX Transportation, Norfolk Southern and Canadian National/Illinois Central.

Tennessee Business By Air:

Tennessee is home to 80 airports, including the second busiest cargo airport in the world (Memphis International). Besides our six commercial airports, Tennessee businesses are served by 74 general aviation airports and 139 heliports.

Tennessee Business By Water:

In Tennessee, you'll have access to more than 1,000 miles of navigable waterways. Our state's terminals on the Tennessee, Cumberland and Mississippi rivers and their tributaries connect with river ports in 21 states, as well as ocean ports in Texas, Louisiana and Alabama. Tennessee is a wonderful place to call home for many reasons, including a favorable cost of living. The average cost of living in all of the state's reporting cities falls below the national average.


Housing costs in Tennessee are also among the lowest in the nation. In 2011, Tennessee ranked 9th lowest among the 50 states in median monthly housing costs for owner-occupied units with a mortgage. The Tennessee Housing Development Agency reports that 45,470 single-family homes were sold in 2011 with a median selling price of \$150,925 and homes outside of the state's metropolitan areas had a median selling price of \$109,000.






COLONIAL PIPELINE

Colonial Pipeline begins in Houston, Texas and ends in Linden, New Jersey, traversing 11 other states along the way. The system includes 5,500 miles of pipe, services 7 airports directly and provides fuel to multiple Department of Defense installations each day. Colonial Pipeline has 15 storage tank locations strategically positioned along the pipeline to serve our customer's needs and connect to more than 260 terminals.

Colonial Pipeline delivers a daily average of 100 million US gallons of gasoline, home heating oil, aviation fuel and other refined petroleum products to communities and businesses throughout the South and Eastern United States.

The main lines are 40 inches and 36 inches in diameter, with one primarily devoted to gasoline and the other carrying distillate products such as jet fuel, diesel fuel, and home heating oil. The pipeline connects directly to major airports along the system. Fifteen associated tank farms store more than 1.2 billion US gallons of fuel and provide a 45 day supply for local communities.

Products move through the mainlines at a rate of about 3 to 5 miles per hour. It generally takes from 14 to 24 days for a batch to get from Houston, Texas to the New York harbor, with 18.5 days the average time.
