Moncrief-Lenoir Co. Spends \$100,000 on Improvement Plan

AMONG its many other distinctions, such as being the greatest inland cotton port in the world, the world's largest cotton compressing center, and other superlative attributes, Houston enjoys the unique position of being the location of the only independent tin can manufacturing plant south of Kansas City and west of New Orleans.

The Moncrief-Lenoir Manufacturing Company, Inc., a million dollar enterprise, is not only the sole independent corporation of its kind in a great expanse of territory, but it is among the largest independent can factories in the United States.

Recently this reporter was shown through the Moncrief-Lenoir plant, located at Semmes and Conti streets. And while monsters of machines boomed like far-off artillery but turned out the tin cans more perfect than could be done by human hand, Mr. Lenoir and Mr. Westwood, who is manager of the tin can department, related something of the history of the company.

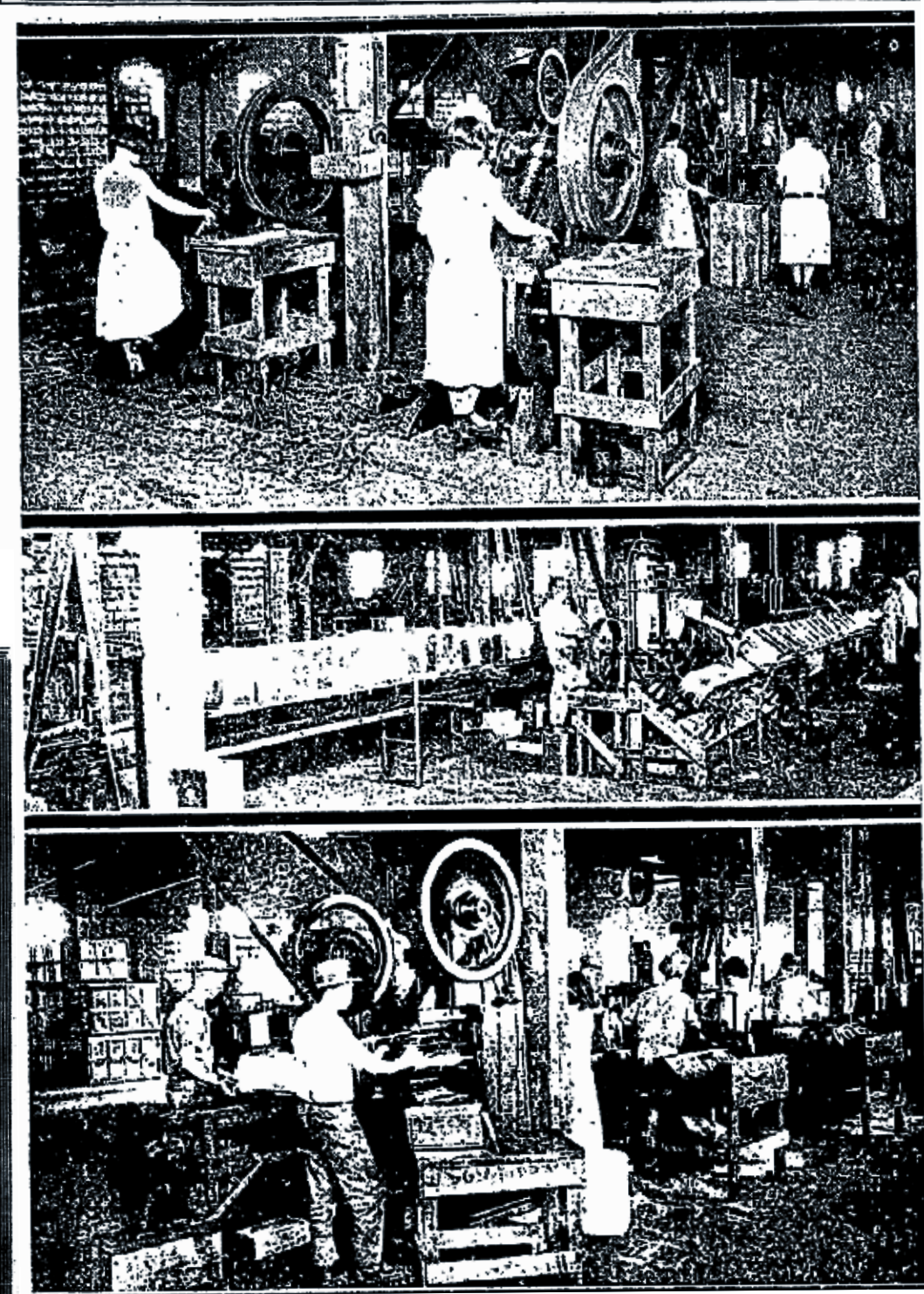
"We hear a great deal about Houston looking in industries," said Mr. Westwood. "Industrially industries are needed in Houston in many lines. But not in the tin can or allied manufacturing."

"Recently someone suggested that Houston ought to do after a tin factory. I was flabbergasted. That sort of coffee companies, and others too numerous for enumeration."

In this connection, consider this fact: This reporter watched the manufacture of one-pound coffee cans at the rate of 2000 an hour, or 60,000 in an eight-hour day. The manufacture began as a flat piece of lithographed tin, obviously run through the press, and emerged at the base line of machinery as a coffee can complete in every detail, and not a human hand touched it from the time the tin was slotted on its outline until it was stacked in the freight cars at the door of the factory.

One of the intricacies of modern manufacturing is that only one of many put-forward daily under the roof of the Moncrief-Lenoir Manufacturing Company.

John Arthur Moncrief, 62, of 1307 Hyde Park boulevard, president of the Moncrief-Lenoir Manufacturing company and a resident of Houston for 14 years, died at 5:45 p. m. Thursday at a local hospital.

Mr. Moncrief was a member of the South Main Baptist church, River Oaks Country club and the Purchasing Agents association.

Mr. Moncrief and W. F. Lenoir moved from Savannah, Ga., to Knoxville, Tenn., in 1909 and formed a company then known as the Knoxville Tinware Manufacturing company. In 1914 the company moved to Houston, bringing nine families to this city.

The partners then entered the tinware business here under the name of the Moncrief-Lenoir Manufacturing company. The business grew rapidly with branch houses established throughout the state.

He is survived by his wife; two daughters, Mrs. H. E. Perry and Mrs. J. A. Sanders, two sons, R. Dozier Moncrief and Stephen Moncrief; nine grandchildren, four sisters, Mrs. Nora Hand, of Dallas; Mrs. Laura Irby of Atlanta, Ga.; Mrs. O. F. Travis and Mrs. C. A. Hart of Dallas, and three brothers, R. L. Moncrief of Newnan, Ga.; Colonel William H. Moncrief of Washington, D. C., and Ed Moncrief of Cleveland, Ohio.

Funeral services will be held at 5 p. m. Saturday at the South Main Baptist church with Rev. M. M. Wolf officiating.

Burial will be in Forest Park cemetery under the direction of the Settergast-Kopf company.

R. Frank Moncrief, Houston industrial pioneer and for nearly three decades a leader in the development of the metal processing industry in the Southwest, died at 4:45 a.m. Tuesday in Memorial Hospital. He was 57 and lived at 3839 Chevy Chase.

At the time of his death Mr. Moncrief was a partner in the newly organized Southwestern Steel Products Company, but for 27 years prior to last May he had served as vice-president and general sales manager for the Moncrief-Lenoir Manufacturing Company, which, with his uncle, J. A. Moncrief, he had helped organize here in 1914. The company manufactures metal cans, sheet metal building material and other metal products.

The buildings will be erected, if bids are favorable, upon the company's property at Lyons, Seawood and Opelousas.

Bids will be taken until June 10. W. E. Simpson, San Antonio consulting engineer, has prepared the plans.

The warehouse will have a reinforced concrete foundation and slabs, steel frame and tile exterior walls. The craneway building will be of steel frame construction with galvanized iron siding.

The three-story building is framed in steel and features rail and truck wells, infrared heating, mercury lighting, fire and burglary protection, a sprinkler system and an intercommunication and paging network.

Metal building components and farm and ranch gates are manufactured and sold by Moncrief-Lenoir, which operates service centers in San Antonio, Dallas, Harlingen, Lubbock and Temple in addition to the Houston facilities on Lyons Avenue.

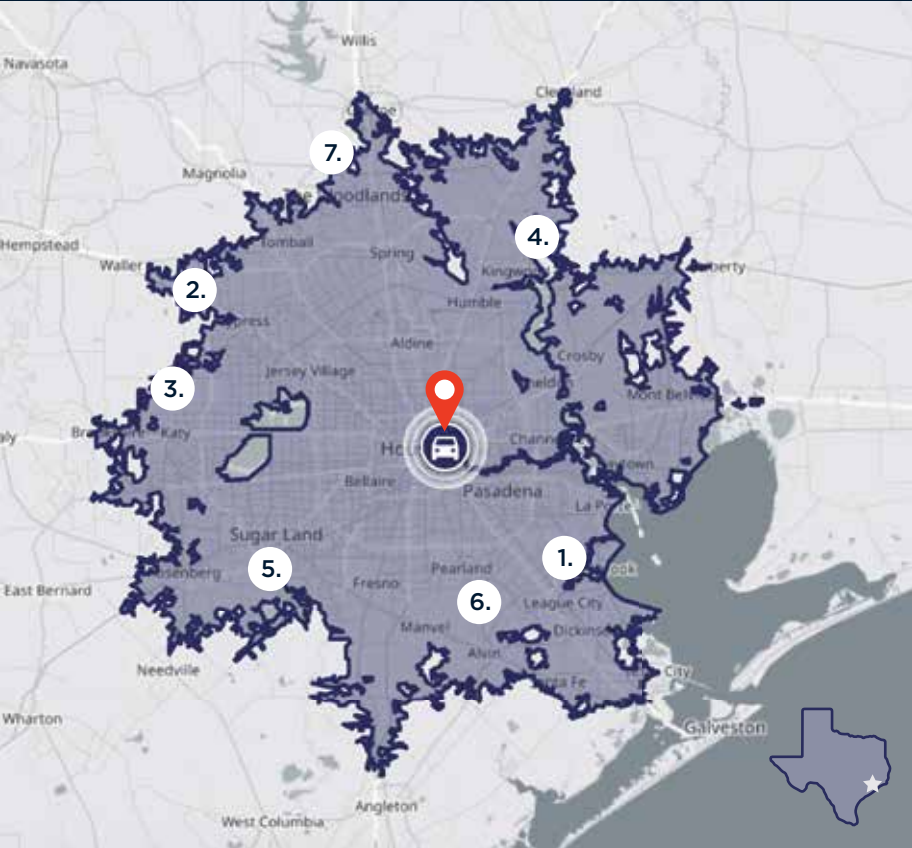

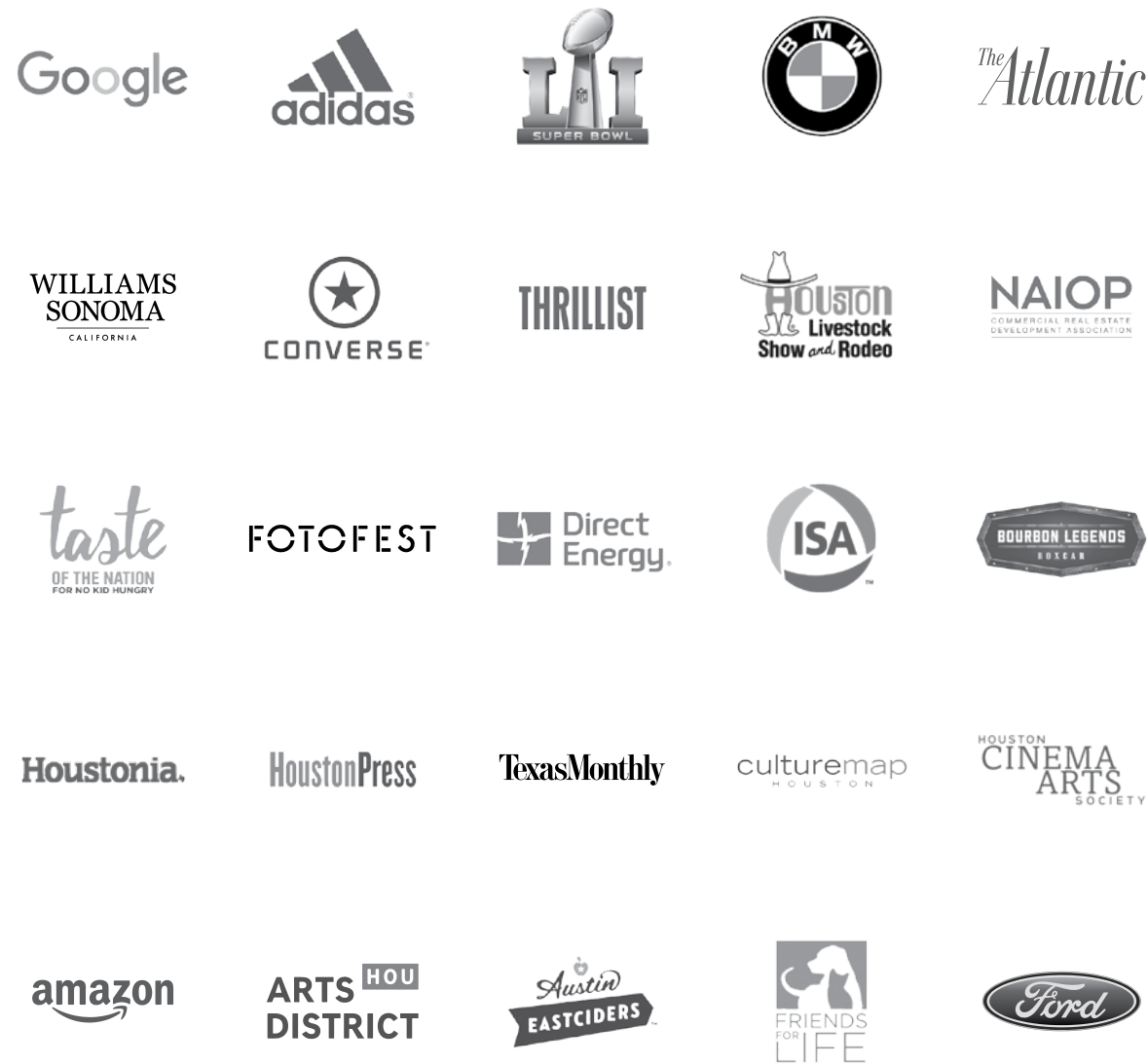
