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

Flint, Michigan is a city defined by its deep roots in American industrial history and its enduring spirit of resilience and renewal. Known as the birthplace of General Motors, Flint earned its nickname "Vehicle City" and played a key role in shaping the labor movement through the historic 1936-37 sit-down strike.
