

The story of 725 Main begins with a German immigrant named Peter Hengen. Born in Prussia in 1832, Hengen arrived in Lafayette in 1852 and soon entered the construction and brickmaking trades. His work played an instrumental role in the repaving and regrading of numerous Old City streets, and the Hengen brickyards became central to building the historic downtown we recognize today. He was also a founding member of St. Boniface Catholic Church.


In 1868, Hengen purchased a narrow parcel at 725 Main from wagonworks businessman William Martin. At the time, the property functioned largely as a workyard. The following year, in 1869, Hengen partnered with two fellow German immigrants—Herman Tengen and John Reitemeier—to construct an ambitious new commercial block encompassing 725, 721, and 717 Main (the latter now home to Revolution Barbeque), likely built with bricks from Hengen's own yards.

The result was a towering three-story Italianate brick business block. It featured stone window hoods, stone-columned storefronts, and a large, ornate cornice trimming the roofline. Crowning the structure was an expansive third-floor social hall—known as Reitemeier and Tengen Hall—spanning from 725 to 717 Main.


Yet even as the building rose, tragedy struck. In February 1869, during construction of the block, Hengen's young daughter, Maria, passed away—one of several personal losses he would endure.


725 Main (175 Main before 1899 change) 1875 Sanborn Fire Insurance Map (Archived at TCHA)




725 Main (175 Main before 1899 change) 1880 Sanborn Fire Insurance Map (Archived at TCHA)




725 Main (175 Main before 1899 change)
1885 Sanborn Fire Insurance Map





1892 Sanborn Fire Insurance Map




725 Main 1899 Sanborn

The earliest confirmed tenant of 725 Main remains uncertain, but by 1872 newspaper advertisements show the space occupied by a furniture store, which remained there for many years. (It is important to note that prior to 1899, Lafayette used a different address numbering system; under that system, 725 Main was known as 175 Main.)

The third-floor social hall became a vibrant center of community life, hosting German social clubs, gatherings associated with St. Boniface, meetings of the Lafayette Guards, and other civic and cultural events.

Tragedy returned in 1874 when Hengen's wife, Elizabeth Bruck Hengen, died while giving birth to their daughter, Ann Elizabeth. The infant survived her mother by only eight days. Hengen later remarried another German immigrant, Wilhelmina Haffner. From 1875 through the end of the 19th century, the first floor of 725 Main was largely home to taverns and saloons, while various businesses occupied the upper stories. At some point, the third-floor portion of 725 Main was physically separated from the larger social hall that once extended across the full block, effectively isolating 725 Main from the rest of what had been a distinctly German commercial center.

In 1896, sorrow struck again when Hengen's son, Joseph, died at age 35 after prolonged health struggles. Hengen himself passed away in 1904 at his home following a lengthy illness. His funeral was held at St. Boniface, and he was laid to rest in St. Joseph Cemetery on Greenbush Street alongside his first wife and their children who had predeceased him.

The early 20th century brought a steady rotation of new enterprises to 725 Main, including a laundry house, a wallpaper and decorating store, a tailoring company, and an office for the National Biscuit Company. Unexpectedly, the upper floors also became home to a thriving socialist organization. In 1912–1913, the Lafayette Socialist Party occupied the building before relocating to the old Winski Building at Fourth and Ferry (now demolished). There, they hosted speakers, political gatherings, debates, caucuses, and nominations—reflecting the broader surge of socialism in Indiana during the era of Eugene V. Debs.

Over the decades, businesses continued to cycle through the storefront: Wear-U-Well shoe repair, mattress retailers, Gunkle’s typewriter store, and a Holden Red Stamp redemption center among them. At one point there was even a Pentecostal church on the upper floors in the 1930’s. In the late 20th century, the building housed a television and radio repair shop and later a data processing center, before closing to public business in the 1990s.

The story of 725 Main is ultimately a story of Lafayette itself—rooted in the labor and aspirations of German immigrants, shaped by commerce and community, marked by personal tragedy and political fervor. From saloons to socialists, from furniture stores to radio repair, this Italianate landmark has continually adapted to the needs of its city.
