



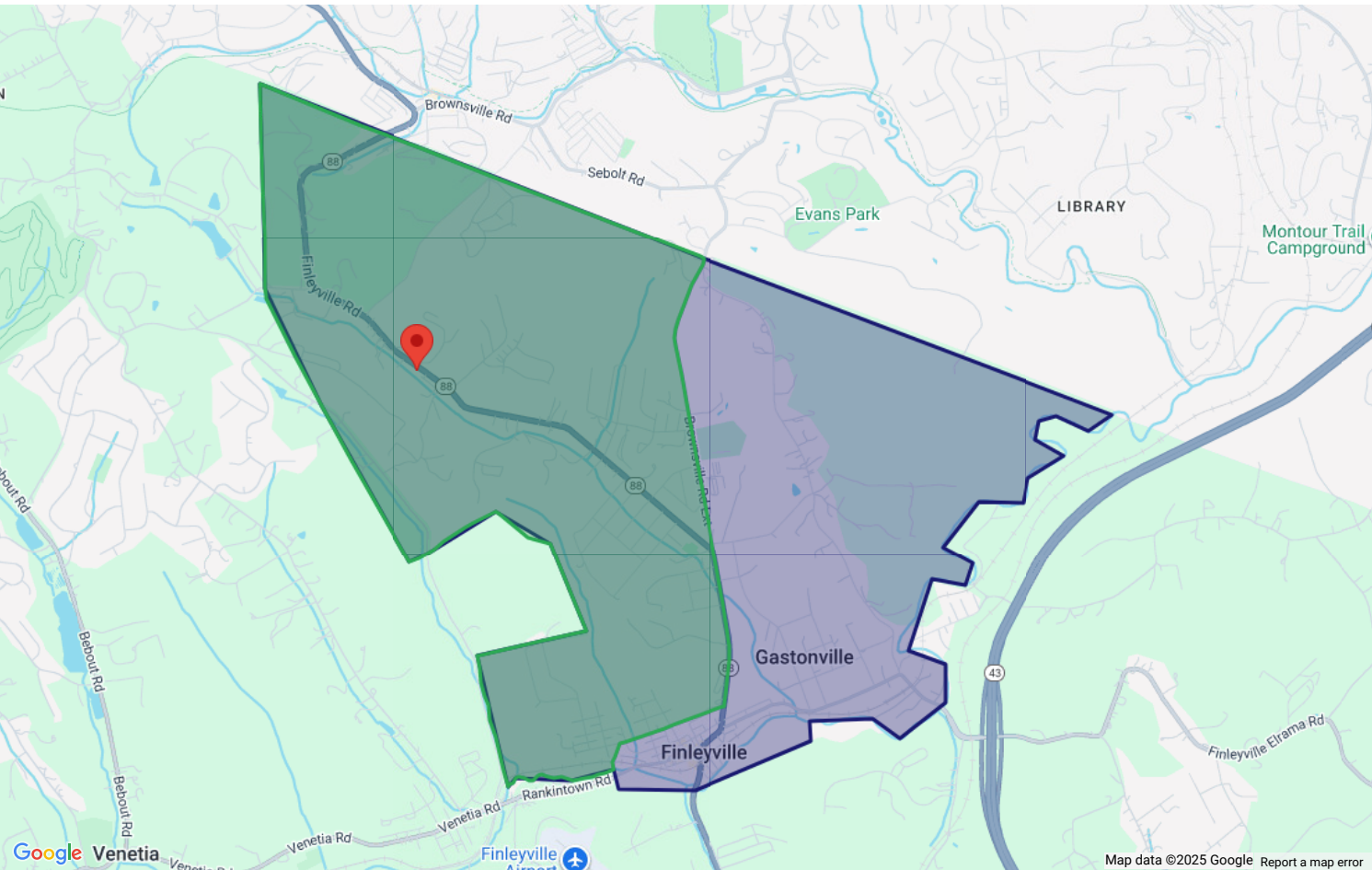

## NOTABLE & UNIQUE NEIGHBORHOOD CHARACTERISTICS

When you see a neighborhood for the first time, the most important thing is often the way it looks, like its homes and its setting. Some places look the same, but they only reveal their true character after living in them for a while because they contain a unique mix of occupational or cultural groups. This neighborhood is very unique in some important ways, according to NeighborhoodScout's exclusive exploration and analysis.

### People

This neighborhood stands out within Pennsylvania for its college student friendly environment. NeighborhoodScout's analysis reveals that this neighborhood is home to a number of college students, is relatively walkable, and above average in safety. In combination, this makes it stand out for a good place for college students to consider. Because a number of college students live here, this neighborhood may be close to a college campus and offer certain amenities nearby geared towards the student body. While it's not an environment for everyone, ambitious scholars can enjoy seasonal excitement between semesters and school breaks, and parents can rest easy knowing that the area has an above average safety rating. For each of these reasons, the neighborhood is rated among the top 6.5% of college-friendly places to live in PA.

### Diversity

Did you know that this neighborhood has more Slovak and Croatian ancestry people living in it than nearly any neighborhood in America? It's true! In fact, 1.7% of this neighborhood's residents have Slovak ancestry and 1.1% have Croatian ancestry.

This neighborhood is also pretty special linguistically. Significantly, 18.1% of its residents five years old and above primarily speak Italian at home. While this may seem like a small percentage, it is higher than 99.5% of the neighborhoods in America.

## THE NEIGHBORS

There are two complementary measures for understanding the income of a neighborhood's residents: the average and the extremes. While a neighborhood may be relatively wealthy overall, it is equally important to understand the rate of people - particularly children - who are living at or below the federal poverty line, which is extremely low income. Some neighborhoods with a lower average income may actually have a lower childhood poverty rate than another with a higher average income, and this helps us understand the conditions and character of a neighborhood.

The neighbors in this neighborhood in Finleyville are middle-income, making it a moderate income neighborhood. NeighborhoodScout's exclusive analysis reveals that this neighborhood has a higher income than 48.3% of the neighborhoods in America. In addition, 1.7% of the children seventeen and under living in this neighborhood are living below the federal poverty line, which is a lower rate of childhood poverty than is found in 76.1% of America's neighborhoods.

What we choose to do for a living reflects who we are. Each neighborhood has a different mix of occupations represented, and together these tell you about the neighborhood and help you understand if this neighborhood may fit your lifestyle.

In this neighborhood, 30.5% of the working population is employed in executive, management, and professional occupations. The second most important occupational group in this neighborhood is sales and service jobs, from major sales accounts, to working in fast food restaurants, with 30.2% of the residents employed. Other residents here are employed in manufacturing and laborer occupations (28.0%), and 11.3% in clerical, assistant, and tech support occupations.

### Languages

The languages spoken by people in this neighborhood are diverse. These are tabulated as the languages people preferentially speak when they are at home with their families. The most common language spoken in this neighborhood is English, spoken by 99.5% of households. Other important languages spoken here include Italian and Polish.

## Ethnicity / Ancestry

Culture is the shared learned behavior of peoples. Undeniably, different ethnicities and ancestries have different cultural traditions, and as a result, neighborhoods with concentrations of residents of one or another ethnicities or ancestries will express those cultures. It is what makes the North End in Boston so fun to visit for the Italian restaurants, bakeries, culture, and charm, and similarly, why people enjoy visiting Chinatown in San Francisco.

In this neighborhood in Finleyville, PA, residents most commonly identify their ethnicity or ancestry as German (37.4%). There are also a number of people of Irish ancestry (23.2%), and residents who report English roots (21.3%), and some of the residents are also of Italian ancestry (19.1%), along with some Polish ancestry residents (10.8%), among others.

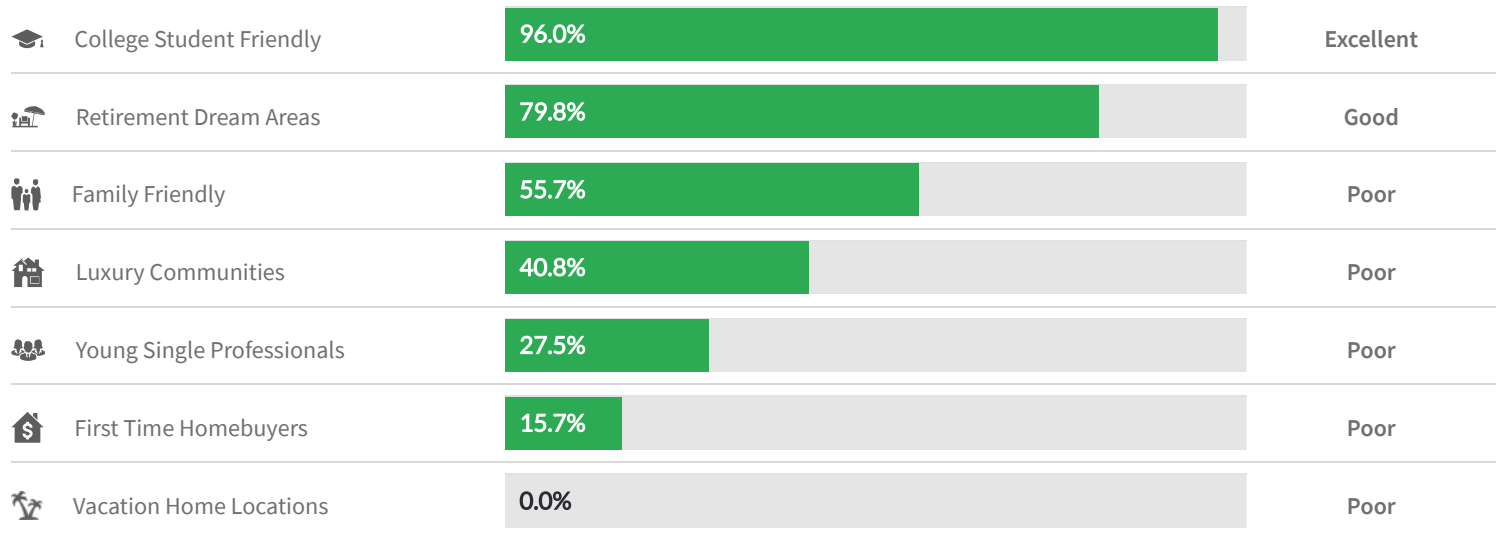
## GETTING TO WORK

How you get to work – car, bus, train or other means – and how much of your day it takes to do so is a large quality of life and financial issue. Especially with gasoline prices rising and expected to continue doing so, the length and means of one's commute can be a financial burden. Some neighborhoods are physically located so that many residents have to drive in their own car, others are set up so many walk to work, or can take a train, bus, or bike. The greatest number of commuters in this neighborhood spend between 15 and 30 minutes commuting one-way to work (51.0% of working residents), which is shorter than the time spent commuting to work for most Americans.

Here most residents (84.5%) drive alone in a private automobile to get to work. In a neighborhood like this, as in most of the nation, many residents find owning a car useful for getting to work.

Percentage of neighborhoods in America that this neighborhood surpasses.

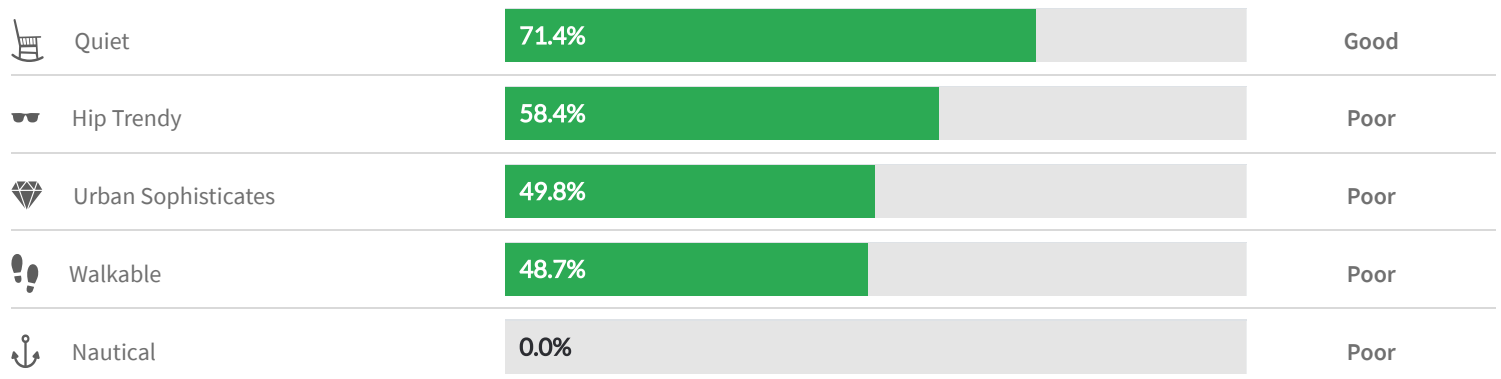

## SPECIAL CHARACTER

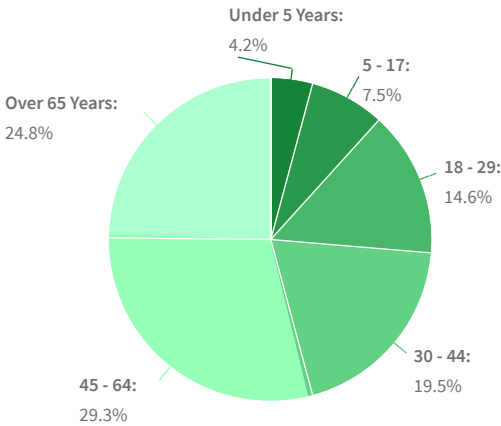
Percentage of neighborhoods in America that this neighborhood surpasses.

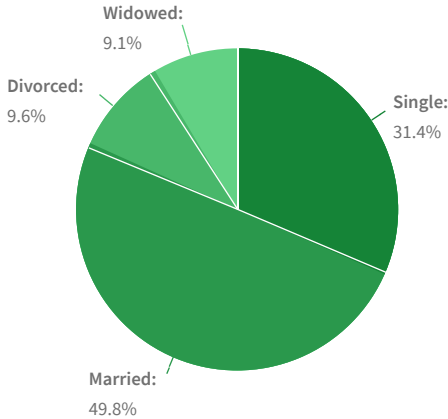
AGE

Neighborhoods that score highest for mixed ages have the most equitable distribution across all age groups.

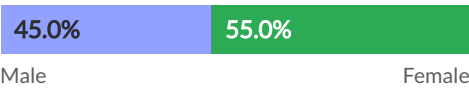


MARITAL STATUS

Based on residents who are 18 and over. We are unable to include same-sex marriages due to data limitations.

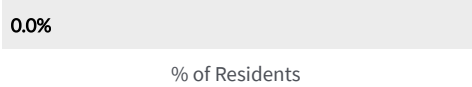

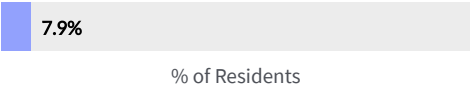
MILITARY

Currently active in the military living on or off base.



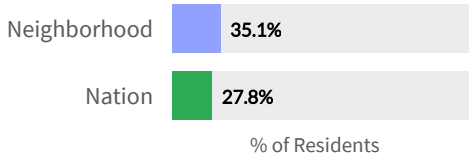
COLLEGE

Enrolled undergraduate or graduate students living on or off campus.

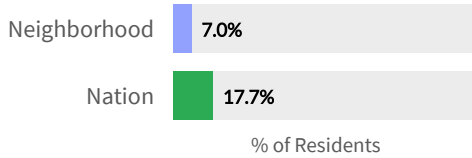

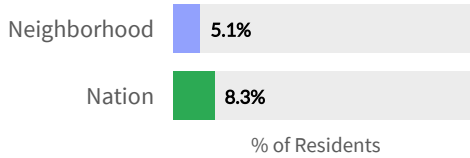
One person households



Married Couple with Child

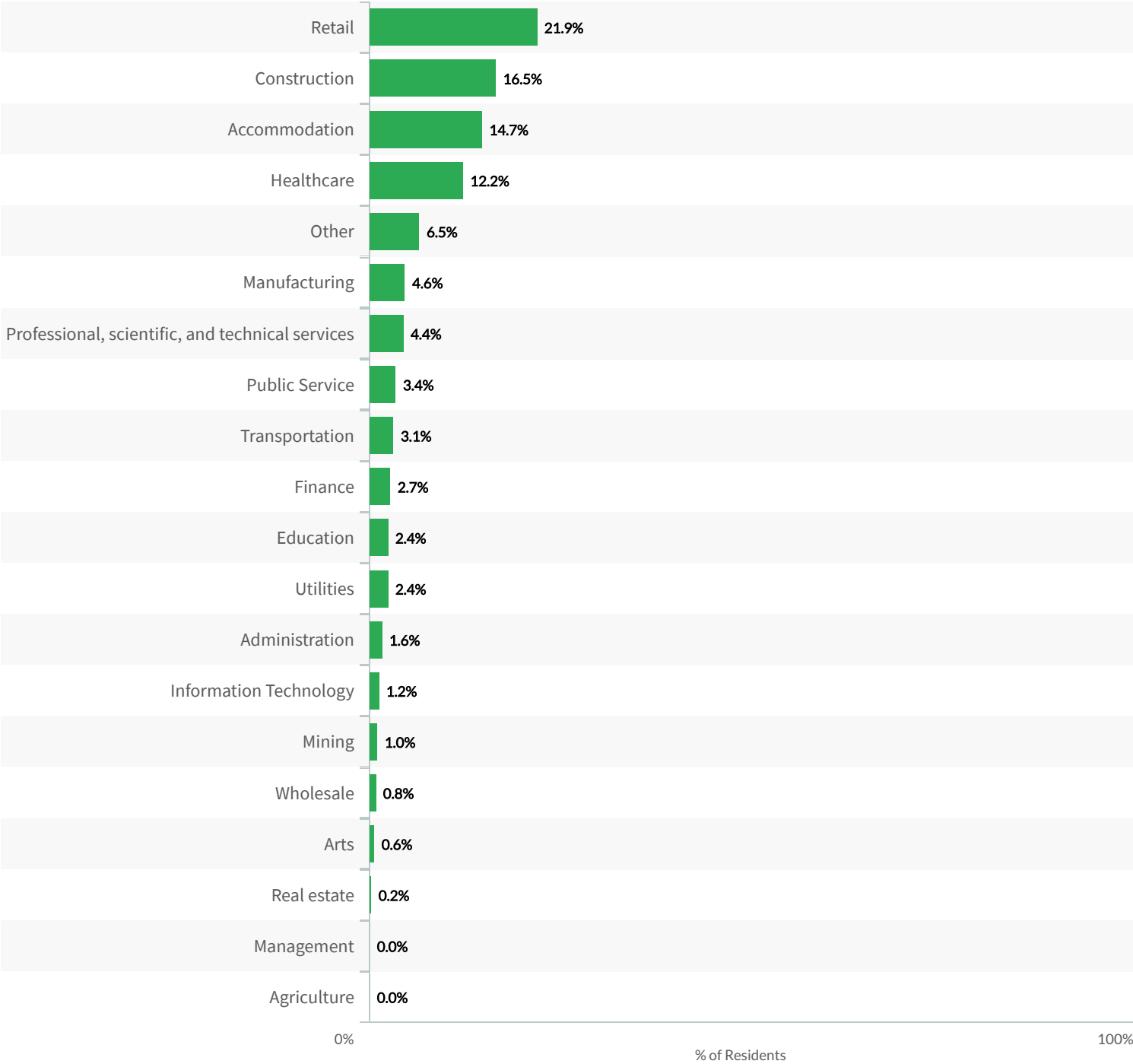


Single Parent with Child



EMPLOYMENT INDUSTRIES

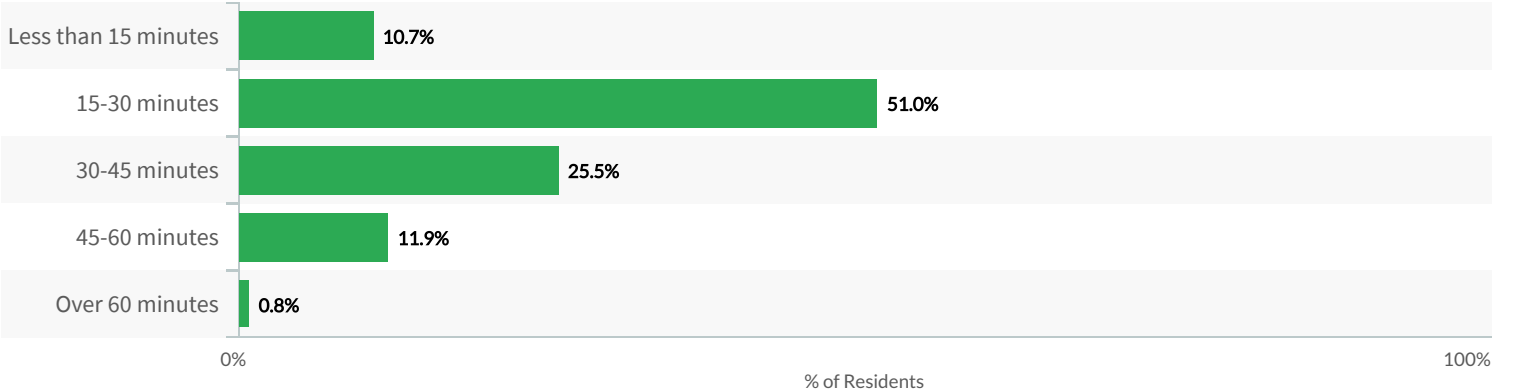
Types of employers for whom residents work. Neighborhoods where residents cluster into particular industries are often found near particular employers or institutions.



COMMUTE TO WORK

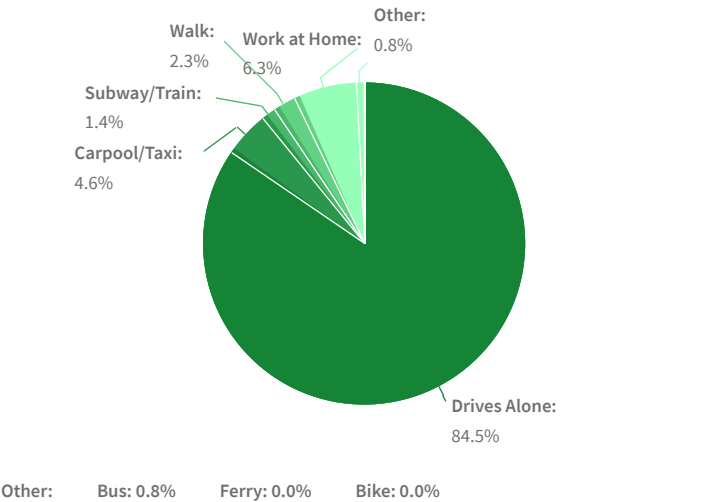
Average One-way Commute Time

The amount of time spent commuting tells a lot about a neighborhood’s access to jobs and the degree of congestion in the area. The time is calculated for all residents working outside the home.



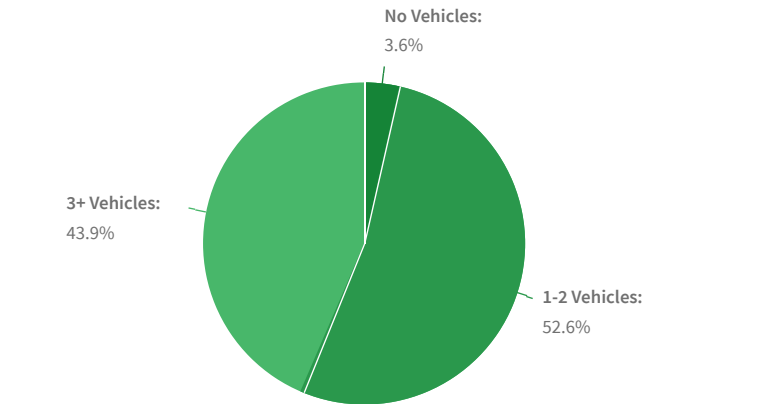
Means of Transport

The share of using each mode of transport is measured as percentage of all working adults.



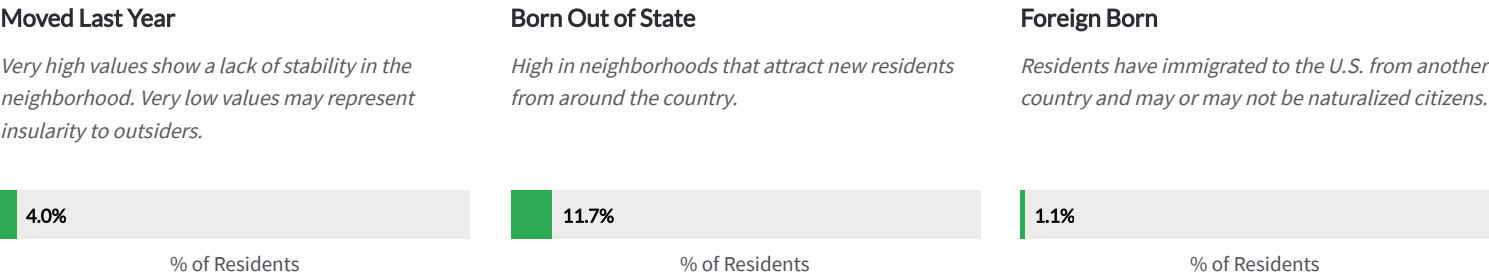
Vehicles per household

Number of vehicles registered per household, as a percentage of all households in the neighborhood.



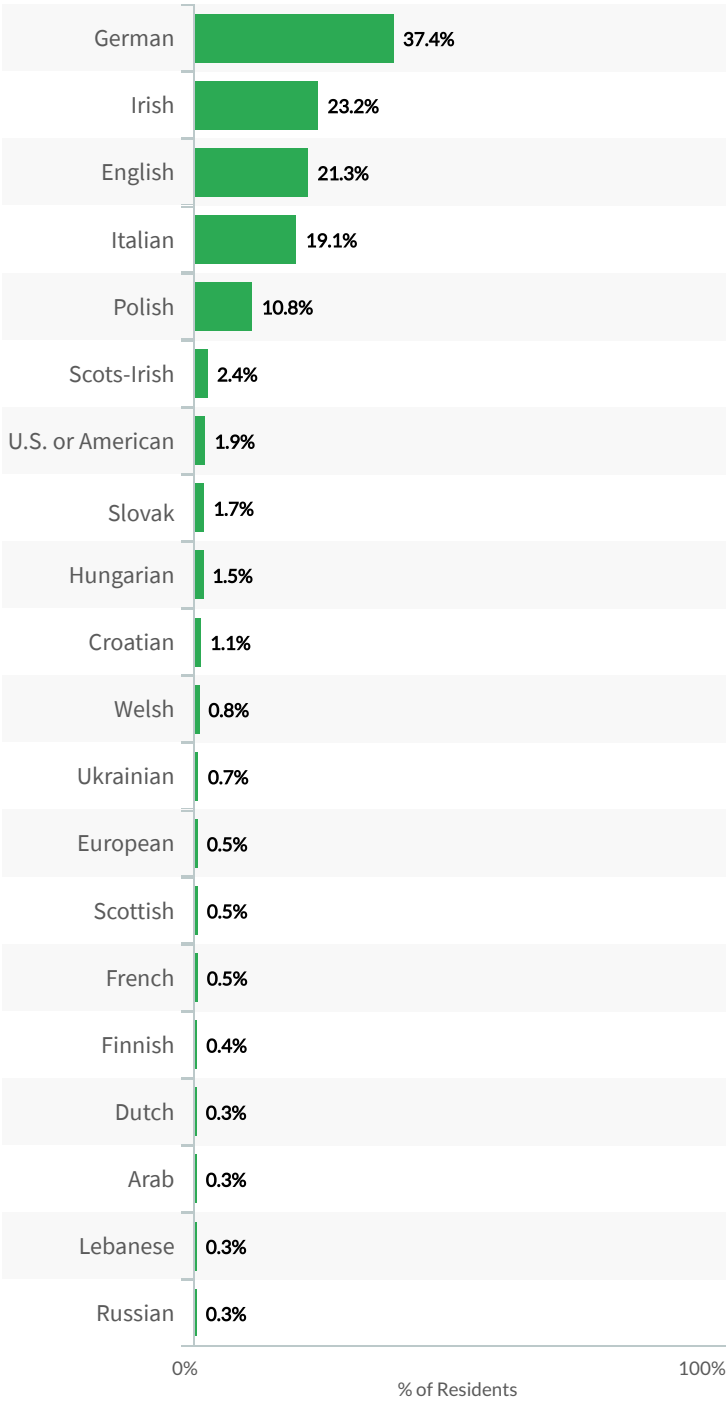

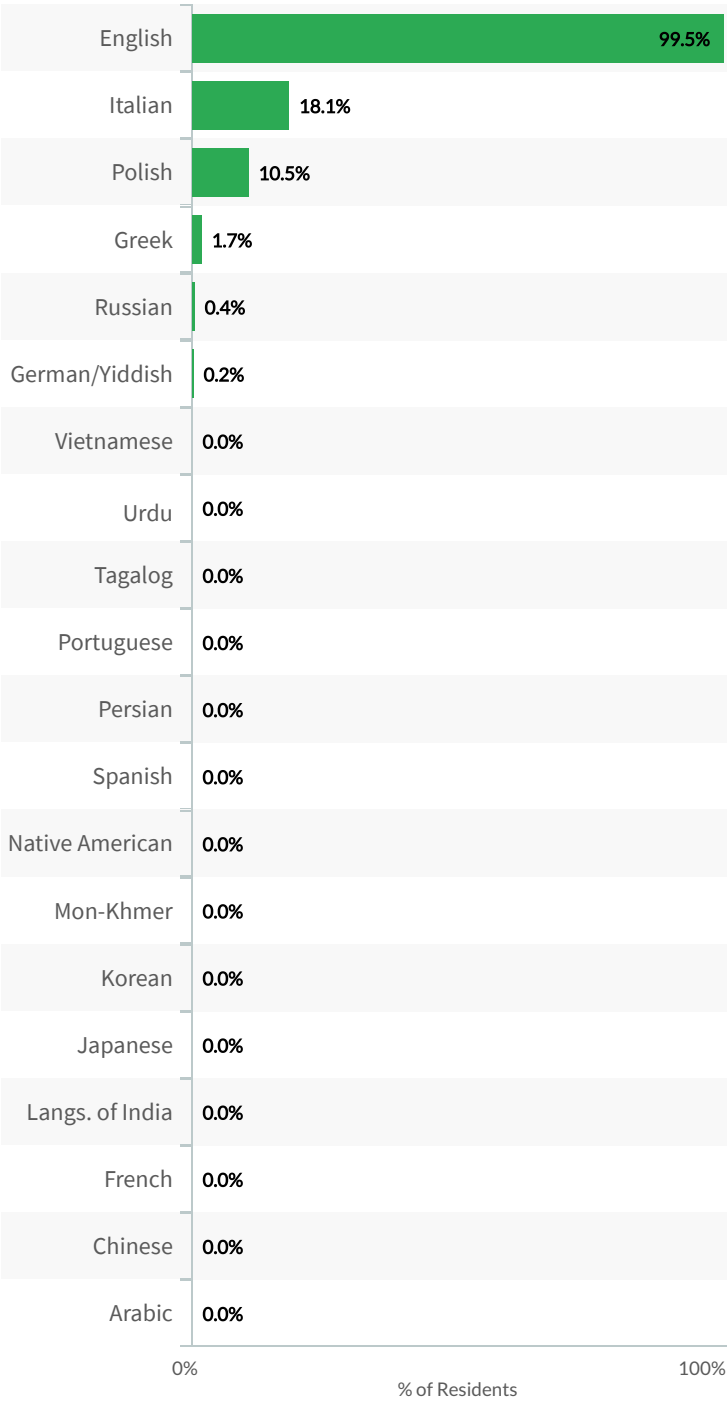
ANCESTRY

LANGUAGES SPOKEN

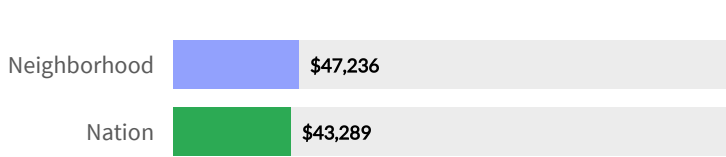
Top 20 most common languages neighborhood residents preferentially speak when they are at home with their families.



AVERAGE INCOME

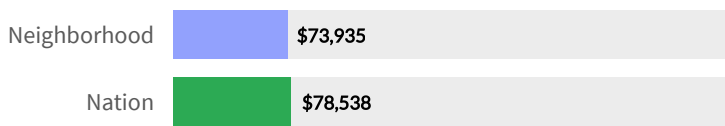
Per Capita Income

Median Household Income

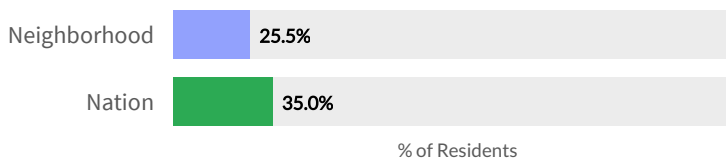
Best measure of the budget of the typical family or other non-family household.

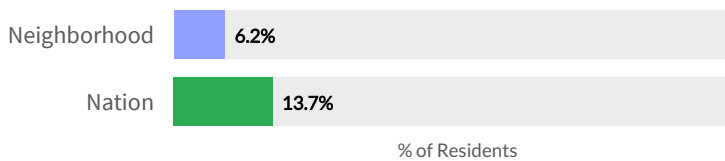
Adults with College Degree

Adults aged 25 and older that have attained at least a 4 year college degree like a BA.



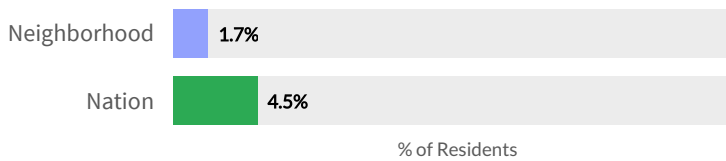
Adults with Advanced Degree

Adults aged 25 and older that have attained a graduate or professional degree above and beyond a 4 year degree.

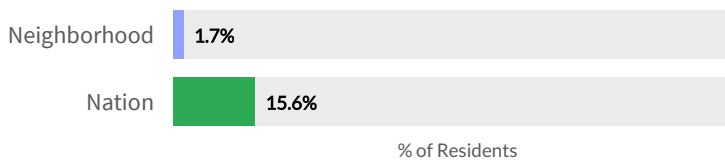


UNEMPLOYMENT RATE

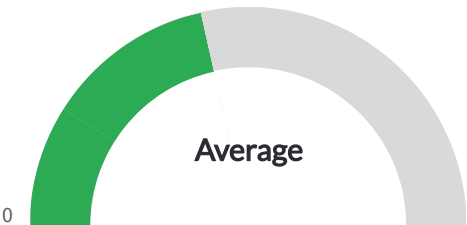
The percent of neighborhood residents who are seeking employment, but are currently unemployed.
